Fair Books French Puppet Show

"Les Poupees de Paris," the adults-only puppet show that almost sailed away from the World's Fair when the Liberte chartered a scrap course, has been salvaged for the fair, after all.

The lavish French show, master-minded by a couple of Greeks named Krofft, has been booked into the new Le Petit Theater now going up on the northeast corner of the fairgrounds.

Originally, the production was signed, sealed and all but delivered as the leading attraction aboard the Liberte. That was before an Italian scapard beat the fair to a booking.

When the Liberte deal fell through, "Les Poupees" was left without a home. Negotiations were resumed as the fair considered building a theater expressly for the puppets. The result was Le Petit Theater, designed by Roland Terry, Seattle architect.

"Les Poupees" will be the night-time fare at Le Petit Theater and the Magic Show by Kajar the day-time attraction. The theater will have two stages, one for each production.

Marty and Sid Krofft, directors of the show and descendants of the famous Krofft marionette-theater family of Athens, staged their first "Les Poupees" production in a small theater outside Los Angeles last year. Within a few weeks, Los Angeles beat a path to the Krofft door. Sellouts were a nightly occurrence, and the Kroffts moved to a larger theater there a few weeks ago.

An entirely new set of 120 puppets, larger in size, is being constructed for the World's Fair show, which will run the entire six months. Basically, however, the show's format will be unchanged, except that it will be longer.

THE KROFFT BROTHERS were in Seattle two weeks ago to study the design for Le Petit Theater and to make certain the stage facilities will be adequate.

"Les Poupees," which is patterned after the Folies Bergere and Lido Club shows of Paris, requires multiple stages in one. The hydraulic stage will include a skating rink, swimming pools, waterfalls, fountains and a mobile pit that will house "a full symphony orchestra."

The revue is coordinated with a sound track that includes the voices of Tony Martin, Edgar Bergen, Charlie McCarthy, Liberace, Charles Boyer and Annie Farge.

Marty Krofft said the production will cost \$150,000 to mount, of which \$50,000 is budgeted for a dazzling wardrobe being designed by Bill Campbell, Las Vegas costumer. The gowns are patterned after those seen in the Parisian and Ziegfeld extravaganzas.

Although it is a puppet show, the nature of the entertainment requires that it be ruled off-limits to youngsters. The fair has set the age limit at 21.

CHANGES NOTED: To bring the fair calendar up to date, several changes or additions announced within the past week are combined in a single announcement.

1. The Youth Symphony Orchestra will play May 20 in the Opera House. Originally it was scheduled for April 30 in the Arena.

2. Joan Baez, popular folk-singer, has been booked for September 30 at the Opera House.

3. Youth for Christ will sponsor a program, "The Splendor of Sacred Song," May 31 at the Arena.

4. Three performances have been added to the schedule of "The Little Circus," which had been signed for 1:30 and 3:30 shows May 6 at the Opera House. The

additional performances will be at 11 o'clock forenoon, 1 and 3:30 the preceding day, May 5.

New dates are announced for the appearance of the D'Oyly Carte company from England. They are September 17 through 22. Its productions will be "The Mikado," "The Pirates of Penzance" and "H. M. S. Pinafore."

6. The appearance at the fair by the Royal Court Dancers of Thailand has been confirmed. Dates at the Opera House will be October 18 through 23.

7. At the same time, the highly acclaimed Thailand Boxing Matches, called more an art than a sport, have been booked for the Arena July 1 through 7.

8. Harold Shaw, performing-arts director, has confirmed the notice that the Greek National Theater, once announced as a fair attraction, has withdrawn.

9. A "major show" is in the making to replace the Ed Sullivan TV program that was canceled out of the April 22 spot.

16 Matisens Paintings Show Mature Discipline

Julius Matisens, who is showing 16 paintings at the Hall-Coleman Galleries, was trained as an artist in Latvia and taught painting there and in Germany before coming to America.

The landscapes and flower paintings in his exhibition were executed after he arrived in Seattle, and many of them are dated 1961. Such paintings as "Southern Landscape," "Riga" and "Village Market" recall either his native country or the Southwest, but "Lake," "Cascades" and "Northwest Landscape" are among those which use aspects of his present environment.

Matisens' characteristic method is to simplify and resolve his spaces with broad strokes, each precisely gauged and put firmly into place.

Direct, mature and disciplined, his painting reflects his European training.

DAVID HALL-COLEMAN, director of the Hall-Coleman Galleries, hung the Chi Omega Art Collectors' Show Thursday, and it never looked better.

Smaller paintings were grouped into picture walls, compositions in themselves, and the remainder of the 280 paintings, sculptures and pots were on well-lighted easels, trestles and stands.

Since one aim of the event is to bring artists and purchasers together without charging a commission, the invited artists respond with work easy to like and attractively priced.

A second purpose is fulfilled in turning profits from door admissions over to the University of Washington for

scholarships and loan funds and to the Seattle Art Museum for purchase awards.

In its 11th year, the Chi Omega Art Collectors' show maintained a high level of taste in the work shown, and showed an impressive advance in ticket sales.

FRIENDS OF Ward Corley attending memorial services for him Thursday night at the University Unitarian Church saw a small retrospective group of his paintings, lent by friends.

From early works of Indian motifs, through his "Bonnard period" and into the remarkable development of his writhing "Bouquets," one traced Corley's diminishing vitality and increasing spirituality.

While Corley lived, "Bouquets" were almost too poignant to look at, they so clearly admit his tenuous connection with life.

But now that events have fulfilled their prophecy, we can marvel at the loveliness of form Corley gave to his essential sadness.

Corley died on March 16, aged 43.
